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

31st ANNUAL GATHERING - MARCH 23rd, 1963.

Our 31st Annual Gathering is now history, and it would seem to be the general opinion that it was a great success, both by measure of spectators and audience.

Although we do not have complete records of entries, it would seem that a record number of entries were received, with 84 entries in the solo piping, 12 quartettes, and 5 miniature pipe bands.

The chief piping judge once again was Pipe Majer John Wilson, of Toronto, Ontario, who judged from 9:00 a.m. until almost 11:00 p.m., with only two half hour breaks for lunch and supper. We were pleased and honoured to have John Wilson with us, and know you will find his observations of our Gathering elsewhere in the Newsletter of considerable interest.

Judge of the short leet was Pipe Major Donald MacKenzie of Powell River. Drumming Judge was Drum Sgt. William Saunders, of the Royal Canadian Engineers Pipe Band, and Mrs. Zelpha Wood judged the dancing competition.

We were pleased to have in our midst James MacColl, of Los Angeles. Pipe Major MacColl attended the summer games a few years ago, but this was his first visit to the Annual Gathering.

James MacColl was the first recipient of the William Campbell Trophy, presented to this Association by Mrs. Camilla Campbell in memory of her late husband Pipe Major William Campbell, M.V.O. This splendid trophy retires the Peter Henderson Trophy - Open Aggregate Championship - and has inscribed on it the names of the winners of that venerable and rather worn trophy. We were very pleased to have Mrs. Campbell with us in person, to present the new trophy to its first winner.

We were also pleased to welcome Mr. Malcolm Graham, from Prince George, and formerly of Edinburgh. Mr. Graham is a recent arrival to Prince George, and is the instructor of the Kiwanis Pipe Band in Prince George. A number of his pupils were in attendance, and we hope to see more of Mr. Graham and his promising flock in the future.

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FROM PIPE MAJOR JOHN ROBERTSON'S SCRAPBOOK:

ANGUS MACKAY AND PIOBAIREACHD:

(To the Editor of the Oban Times)

Lochnagar, Edinburgh, January 23, 1937.

Sir - "Hebridean's" letter in your issue of January 16 has done much to gild the pages of Angus MacKay's great work in the collection and preservation of ancient piobaireachd.

John Ban MacKenzie was a bagpipe maker of no mean order, and it is to him that we owe the production of the finished pipe chanter in use today. I have heard that Donald MacKay was also a pipe maker.

I received my training entirely from Pipe Major Ronald MacKenzie, nephew of the famous John Ban, and from Ronald I noted much of what I have preserved for future generations of pipers, of the history of John Ban, the MacKays' and the MacCrimmons'.

I was piper to Abercairny for a number of years, thus following in the footsteps of the great family of the MacKays, for Donald MacKay who was piper to the Duke of Sussex was for a time also piper at Abercairny. I thank "Hebridean" for his able and unbiased letter in praise of Angus MacKay.

From Invershin we get "Angus MacKay dismantled" with all his greatness seemingly swept away. We have read Mr. Macpherson's letters so often that we can almost tell what he is going to say before we look at them. The MacCrimmons and their capabilities are now common history and well known to all. John Dail MacKay was as great a performer as the MacCrimmons. That we know from the "Unfinished Piobaireachd" which rubbed some of the lustre off the Dunvegan masters. But John, to all, cannot be compared with Angus MacKay. We ought to give honour to whom honour is due and raise a memorial to the memory of the man who has preserved for us our inheritance in piobaireachd. He is the most ungrateful piper living who would not agree to that.

I shall now set all others in the piping world aside save Angus MacKay and Mr. A. Macpherson. I can tell Mr. Macpherson here and now that Angus MacKay wrote Taorluath and Crunluath exactly as he played them and as the MacCrimmons played them also.

If Mr. Macpherson thinks that there is a redundant "A" in the Taorluath and Crunluath in Angus Mackay's work, then I can only place him in the ranks of the redundant pipers, as he does not understand those movements which are the crowning features of ancient piobaireachd.

Inveran Hotel, Invershin, February 6, 1937

Sir - Once again we have Mr. John Grant's autobiography in the columns of your esteemed paper, dated January 23, and the Grant "Tree" again ostentatiously written for our perusal. Were it not for Mr. Grant's last sentence, I would leave his self-praise alone, but now, I am replying to his letter in a way - although Mr. Grant professes to know what I have written, before he reads my letters - that he will not expect.

Mr. Grant makes a proud boast of his being piper at Abercairny, "Thus following in the footsteps of the MacKays'". Surely he is aware that being a piper at Abercairny, does not constitute a Grant becoming a MacKay, any more than it would a Macpherson becoming a MacCrimmon, were he to be piper at Dunvegan Castle. Mr. Grant would not have been piper to Abercairny were it not for this circumstance. The position of piper was open at Cluny Castle and at Abercairny at the same time; I was offered both but refused Abercairny's offer, preferring to follow in the footsteps of my ancestors who were taught their Piobaireachd by the MacCrimmons of Skye, long before Angus MacKay was in existence. Mr. Grant then took over the position which I had refused.

Mr. Grant accuses me of having dismantled Angus MacKay of all his greatness; on the contrary, if he will read my previous letter correctly, he will find that the exact opposite is the true fact. It is very significant that on the same page as Mr. Grant's letter appears a new march composed by Pipe Major Roderick Campbell, a respected friend of mine and a good piobaireachd player: In it, Mr. Grant will find for his instruction, that the Taorluath movement is correctly written, the same as is published by the Piobaireachd Society and taught by their teachers, and as played by the leading pipers of the present day. There is therefore, little hope that "future generations" will adopt Mr. Grant's alien method of writing Taorluath and Crunluath.

It matters little to me in what category I am placed by Mr. Grant. When he can emulate the record held by the family from whom I am descended, he will then be in a position to write with authority.

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
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

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CEILIDH - March 21st.

The Ceilidh, held on March 21st, 1963, in Honour of Pipe Major John Wilson, was one of the finest evenings of piping held for some time, thanks chiefly to the guest of honour himself - John Wilson, and to James McColl, of Los Angeles. Both of these performers gave an interesting and varied programme, which was very well received by the capacity crowd of members assembled in the band room of the Seaforth Armoury.

The highlight of the evening was undoubtedly the masterful rendering by John Wilson of a piobaireachd little heard in the West Coast - "Lament for the Viscount of Dundee."

We are grateful to John Wilson and James McColl for sharing their talents with us so generously, and making the Ceilidh so enjoyable.

CALIFORNIA HERE WE COME - WITH BAGPIPES: (from Weekly Scotsman, Feb. 14;1963)

The tenth district of California should soon be a Mecca for bagpipe firms interested in the export trade. And this district, which takes in the Stanford University, Palo Alto, and San Jose areas has certainly given a tartanic ring to the Congressional legislation.

For Congressman Charles S. Gubser, who represents the tenth district has introduced a Bill - HR 1618 to be exact - "To provide that bagpipes and related items used in bagpipe bands shall be admitted free of duty."

According to our informant, Mr. William B. Henderson of Arcadia Place, Washington, this Bill "is a further manifestation of the increasing and active interest in this country in matters Scottish. It was at the request of constituents interested in this aspect of Scottish culture that Mr. Gubser introduced HR 1618."

Certainly if ways and means can be found for this item in the first session of the 88th Congress there should be a new skirl in the tenth district, which is almost a subrb of San Francisco.

Of course all parts of the United States would benefit from this legislation, if approved. So the toast should be hearfelt American thanks to Congressman Gubser.

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JORDAN PIPE BAND FOR NEXT YEARS' FESTIVAL: (from Weekly Scotsman Mar. 14, 1963)

Brigadier Alasdair Maclean, organiser of the Edinburgh Festival Tattoo, believes in travelling around to find new attractions for the event. Not long ago he was in New York. This week he is off to Beirut and Amman to see the 70 strong Royal Jordanian Guards Pipe Band who are to appear at the Festival next year.

There is a chance that they may also be seen at this year's Festival. They play Scottish-made bagpipes but have not yet got round to wearing the kilt.

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HIS PLAYING RAISES A STORM: (letter to the Editor, Weekly Scotsman, from Coldfield, Warwickshire)

Here in the Midlands the other Saturday, I came across a young man playing the bagpipes. He was in the middle of a field in a snowstorm. 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


