

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

Dear Sir,

The question of certificates has reared its head again. Whether by S. MacNeil, (I wonder who gave his uncle the "Blind Piper"and Wm. Ross certificates) or by some other school of piping.

I am not against certificates as a goal to reach, but it does not necessarily make the holder of a certificate an outstanding teacher or judge.

I have heard good players who were not outstanding either as teachers or judges. They like to hear piping the way they taught and had a "closed mind" to other styles of playing.

I think a good teacher or judge needs a very keen ear and a great amount of concentration, which a certificate does not give. If he charges money for teaching, he should keep a close watch over his pupil, I have noticed some young competitors with the thumb of the bottom hand in the wrong position for the proper balance.

Also anyone wanting to learn the pipes can accomplish this if he or she seeks out the proper tutor as proven by the many good players in this area turned out in the past.

P. M. Donald MacLeod wrote awhile back in this "News Letter" expressing his thoughts on certificates and from what I read he was not too impressed.

I do not think a good ear or concentration can be brought about by a piece of paper.

After many requests and several meetings the executive of the Nanaimo Highland Games have decided to go ahead and put on their Gathering July the ninth.

Our prize money is on a par with most of the Gatherings in the North West, in some cases better. We will have competent adjudicators for the piping and drumming.

We also belong to the International which in itself gives the competitors a chance to pick up points for the International trophys.

There will be no gate charge at Nanaimo even though we know that it will cost us about fifty five hundred dollars for the day. It is a lot of money, so we really hope all competitors and bands will get behind us and respond to our plea.

I write this wee note to remind all pipers and pipe band leaders that the Nanaimo Highland Games are on once more after a one year absence.

PATRICK OG MACCRIMMON'S LAMENT Cumha Phadruig Oig Mhic Craimein

PATRICK Og was the son of Patrick Mor MacCrimmon, and he succeeded his father as hereditary piper at Dunvegan. This Lament was composed while Patrick Og was still living. The composer was John MacKay, better known as "Am Piobaire Dall," or the blind piper, who was also a Gaelic bard of some note. He was born at Gairloch, Ross-shire, in 1666, and lived for the long period of ninety-eight years. He acquired the elements of music from his father, "Ruairidh Dall," or blind Rory, who was a native of Sutherlandshire. John Dall Mackay was sent to be educated at the MacCrimmon College, where he soon outstripped all the other students, a fact which caused them to seek to get rid of him by throwing him over a cliff--known to this day as "The blind Man's Leap"--"Leum an Doill." Leaving the College at Skye he succeeded his father at Gairloch, where he composed many Piobrochs, Reels, and Jigs. Having heard of the demise of his preceptor, Patrick Og MacCrimmon, he composed a Lament for him. Some time afterwards he discovered that the report was unfounded, and decided to visit Skye. Among the tunes he played during his visit was the recently composed Lament. MacCrimmon enquired where he had learned it, and, after some hesitation, John Dall admitted that he had composed it for Patrick Og. "Indeed," said MacCrimmon, "Cumha Phadruig Oig's e fhein beo fhathast" (a Lament for Patrick Og and he still alive), adding, "I must learn to play my own Lament." John Dall MacKay died in 1754.

KNOCKOUT AND RECITAL

The Piping recital by P/M Iain Morrison was held at the Scottish Auditorium on 2 April, the same night as the knockout between Richmond sen. No. 2 and Triumph St No. 2 with Triumph st. coming out an easy wirner, as Richmond failed to show up. Triumph st. of course played, and sounded very well indeed, but it does get a bit tiresome when a band fails to turn up without even the common decency to notify anyone with a phone call beforehand, after all, these trio competitions were put on for the benifit of the bands. An entry fee was suggested as one alternative with the hope that it might make the trio!s keener firstly as a larger pot, and secondly not to forfiet their entry fee. I don't want to dwell on this subject too long so a few words about P/M Igin Morrisons Piping recital, for those of you who were unlucky enough not to hear it, I believe it was one of the best ever played in Vancouver. I must point out that it is not only my opinion, but of countless others who commented on his performance, I could see quite a number of tape recorders going, and I know the recordings made for the B. C. Pipers turned out very well indeed, thanks to John MacDonald, who always does a first class job, so if you happen to read this article P/M Morrison, thank you again on behalf of the B. C. Pipers for a first class recital, and a first class job over two gruelling days of Judging, and also many many thanks to his regiment for making Iain available to us.

At the March board meeting the question of the B. C. Pipers tape library was brought up, and it was generally agreed upon, to catalogue and make copies of the better recordings from years back, when some of these are duplicated they will be made available to members of the association for study and learning. I hope some will be ready by the next newsletter for listing, with names such as R. W. Brown, Bob Nicol, Donald McLeod, and Hector McFadyen. Im sure that they will be a benifit to all piping.

The morning of the 45th Annual indoor gathering dawned to a steady rain and overcast skies and as I heard one person remark (typical games weather) which was indeed typical of the weather round the games last summer, but of course the magic word was indoor and in that respect we were very fortunate. The gathering being held in North Vancouver Rec. Centre, the location is quite good the tuning rooms are also fair. The acoustics in the main hall are not the best and the kitchen leaves a lot to be desired, but it is the only place we have found so far, with enough on the plus side to make the gathering workable.

It seems the rain did not keep people away as our numbers were up from last year both in participants and audience, the latter I must say were on there very best behavior and gave the pipers the utmost courtesy both when tuning and playing their pipes, a fact verified by the judge P. M. Iain Morrison.

It was very gratifying to see such a large entry from the Proffessional Pipers which after all is what we are striving for (the finished and polished piper) also the large entry from the miniature Bands, which was a keen competition indeed, and a warm hello to Clan McBain from Calgary, Viscount Park from stony Plain Alberta on their first visit to the B. C. Pipers Annual Gathering, I sincerly hope they will visit us again.

Also at this time I would like to extend all the very best to the rest of the Bands and Individual Pipers who make our gathering a success, one piper even came as far away as Illinois U. S. A.

There was a Caliedh at the windup which I personally thought was a bit of a flop, compared to last year. It might be worth looking into, about hiring some musicians to come and entertain after the games, but all in all, over the two days things went very well, P. M. Morrison has promised to send back his views on the games and on the piping he heard, which I hope to have in the next newsletter.
