It certainly builds up confidence of young players in the competitive field, and above all, it tries to instil the beauty of the music whether it be a simple march or one of the great examples of the Ceol Mor.

Praise must go to the younger competitors for the high standard of playing, it certainly impressed me. My only comment on this, concerns the instrument they were playing. I felt that they were concentrating more on how to get from the beginning to the end of a performance without choking etc. rather than thinking of the music being played. The reason for this was some were blowing an instrument that was too strong for them, and in some case's throughout the competition it spoiled very good performance's.

The professional competition was of a high standard as was expected, it was a good competition to Judge. Again I would just like to add one comment which I know in the professional field is very important.

Some of the professional competitors tend to be very careless with the finger technique and this is when they ask themselves, and wonder why they didn't manage to make it into the prize list. Nevertheless I was very impressed with the high standard of Playing overall.

To conclude I would like to mention how efficient the stewarding was, and obviously this praise must go to the association.

May I finish by wishing each and everyone concerned with the piping fraternity the very best of luck in the future.

Dear Sir:

Our Highland Games in Nanaimo on July 9, 1977 was a very successful day in many ways. The weather was perfect with both spectators and participants enjoying the day as it moved along. It was gratifying to the committee who worked so hard for many weeks prior to the games.

However we were disillusioned and frustrated in one important aspect of a Highland Games — "Piping". We should make the "Guiness Book of Records" in being the first International Highland Gathering without a pipe band entry. If you think I'm angry about this, you are right on. Fortunately for us the approximately thirty odd pipers and drummer on hand for the individual events volunteered to a man to help us. They formed a massed band and piped the parade for the official opening. Besides this they performed in a massed band march to the delight of all in attendance. To each of them our grateful thanks.

I wonder just what Kimberley has done to promote Highland Games here in the Pacific Northwest and why our pipe bands by-passed Nanaimo to go to Kimberley. Nanaimo has spent 20 years in promoting Highland Games. Granted the bands were given, I understand, an all expends paid trip but if there was no other remuneration but expenses, - why? If it was just for beer and pretzels - Jeez what a thought.

If a tattoo can be set up in such a short period of time then why do not the bands get together and put one on in Vancouver and divide the profits among themselves to bolster there band funds. If my comment on the Kimberley trip is near the truth I feel they sell a top product very cheaply.

I believe the prize money has been too low and must be upgraded. Ian Whitelaw will confirm this as we discussed this during the Victoria Games. The problem is - where does the extra money come from? Upon looking at the prize money list of two of the Games coming up in July (whose committees must have a key to a bank) I wonder why the pro's would attend any other gathering. That is if money is the sole purpose of these gatherings. Sure the top competitors work like hell all year and I say that sincerely but what credit ever goes to the people and committees who also work like hell all year, every year, to keep the competitions going.

The lack of entries and support here in Nanaimo this year makes you wonder if its all worthwhile. I for one am ready to throw in the sponge. Anyone who takes on this voluntary task had better be prepared for a hard and sometimes thankless task.

Dear Sirs:

Being the inventor of the Electric Bagpipe, I take the pleasure, in sending you the following information.

A piper wishing to change over for the time being, to play the electric bagpipe, takes out the pipebag of the traditional set, putting it away, ready to be used again at anytime. The piper then places the drones, chanter and blowstick into the stocks of the electric unit, which is similar in size and shape as the traditional pipebag. All is contained in this unit with only the cable extending from the rear. The switch is near to the chanter and convenient for the bottom fingers to press to start and then again to stop.

The blowstick is only used when giving one puff at the start, after the button is pressed, in order to set the reeds vibrating properly.

There is a hum off the motor but slight and cannot be heard within reason when the pipes are fully sounding. P/M Donald MacLeod, a top player in Scotland and record breaking champion, told me that he does not hear the hum. He also thought that it is a wonderful invention. P/M Angus MacDonald, Scots Guards and all the top players I have contacted have the same favourable opinion. P/M J. B. Robertson, M.B.E. (Ret.) Scots Guards, had to give up playing seven years ago, through health reasons. When he saw me on T.V. he immediately wrote and also telephoned from the South of England for me to send an Electric Unit. His comments now are, that it a great pleasure in doing so.

The unit cost is 140 pounds plus 10 pounds package and delivery. I think that delivery should take about three weeks.

I have appeared on several T.V. programmes in Scotland, also two Radio programmes and one tape, performed in Glasgow for New Zealand. It was broadcast throughout the whole of New Zealand on Radio New Zealand network. It was heard on both North and South islands. Gordon Irving (Worldwide Features) Glasgow, contributor to Variety, New York; C.B.C. Radio, Toronto etc. informed me that what he and I put on the tape, playing and talking, created great interest.

I would be very pleased, if readers could be informed in your article, if they send a cassette tape, C60 size recommended, along with postage and attention expenses, 76c, I will duplicate the talk and selections, as enclosed, lasting 18 minutes. The tape will be returned with further literature information.
