

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EDITORIAL

Well, here I am back again! At the outset I want to make it clear that my position as Editor of the Newsletter is only temporary, as in not permanent, as in here for a good time not a long time. In other words, the opening for Editor of the B.C. Pipers' Newsletter has not yet been filled and I am still eagerly awaiting some interested party or parties to rush into my house and carry off the Gestetner. Actually we're not using the Gestetner any longer, opting instead for a professional printer (hope you've already noticed), so now the job is a real pushover.

Seems to me the last time I wrote an editorial I got in a spot of trouble ...

One topic that seems to generate a lot of discussion at this time of year is pipe band judging. Although there are "incompetent" judges no matter where you go, I believe our method of judging bears closer inspection. For a start the judging sheets themselves require redesigning, but we'll leave that one for another day.

The biggest problem I think is in the scoring system. Under the current set up, three piping judges are given 75 points with which to adjudicate a band. The drumming judge is given 100 points. At the conclusion of each band's performance the judges must submit their sheets to the chief steward, who in turn passes them over to the scorer. The total of the piping judges' scores are tabulated and then divided by three. The drumming judge's score is divided by four. This gives a total score of piping and drumming out of 100. Sounds pretty straightforward except that two things happen. First of all, by taking away the point sheets at the end of each performance the judge is unable to "listen" to the whole class, evaulate each band, and formulate his opinion at the finish of the event. So, in effect, each band is judged separately against the score sheet instead of against each other. Theoretically, that would be ideal but practically it is very difficult. No one would ask a solo judge to submit his score at the conclusion of each performance. We even have panels of judges in solo contests who are allowed to discuss the whole class before arriving at a decision. There are ways around it with the use of "cheat sheets", a piece of paper the judge uses to keep track of the scores of the previous bands, but it is still a big inconvenience for the judge. The panel system seems more suited to pipe bands where judges cannot always see or hear the other side of the band.

However, I feel our biggest area of concern lies in the allocation of points. Basically, under present rules one judge, piping or drumming, can bury a band and over the past few years most of us have "enjoyed" the experience of having one judge "do us in", unintentionally I think. I believe this "incompetency" can be attributed to inexperienced judges (inexperienced with the system that is), lack of direction and education from the W.P.B.A. and more importantly the system itself. To give an example to our non-pipe band readers of the problem, I submit the following scenario.

Judges A, B, C and D (drumming). Judges A and B feel X band won piping but only give a one point spread between X band and their second place Y. Judge C, however, feels Y band gave the prizewinning performance and places them 5 points ahead of band X. Assuming that the drumming judge has also kept his point spread between one and two, one judge has overruled the decision of the other three.

Even more ludicrous is the situation in which a drumming judge, who remember has only 25% of the total score at his disposal, can overturn the 3 piping judges.

What I would prefer to see is a merit or aggregate point system. For instance, where there are 4 bands in a class, 1st place from a piping judge would entitle that band to 4 points, 3 points for 2nd and 2 for 3rd. Placings from drumming judges would be 25% of the above. Using this method, one judge could not overrule the others. There are ways, of course, to abuse this sytem, especially with a large class, but, as I mentioned earlier, I honestly don't believe we have local judges bent on upsetting decisions.

One of the major objections to using this type of system is that an individual judge, piping or drumming, cannot reward a band for an outstanding performance nor, conversely, intentionally mark low for a poor showing. However, is this really important? A judge will still mark his point sheet out of 75. If he feels one band deserves 75 points and another only 50 then that is his perogative. The only flaw that I can perceive is where a band with a consistently winning pipe section could win with a very poor drum corps.

I would be interested in hearing comments from pipe band members on this topic.

Of particular interest to me, were the ideas put forth by the adult pianist. His talk culminated ine one of the most beautiful stores regarding music that I have ever heard. It went something like this.

At the age of three, while rummaging in the attic, he came upon a piece of music, which turned out to be classical composition. He was already an accomplished player, and could easily sight read music. He went to the piano and played it. When finished, he felt so moved he rushed upstairs to tell his brothers and sisters that he now knew there was no need to fear the darkness, or the future, or anything anymore. That there is absolute perfection in life, and therefore order in the universe.

This pianist then went on to play the music he had discovered those many years ago. Unfortunately, I can't remember the music that was played, or the pianist's name, but it is a beautiful memory just the same.

I believe that we in the piping world can relate that feeling of order and symmetry in the music we play and love. I hope you, my fellow musicians, derive as much inspiration from this story as I did.

ONE VERY IMPORTANT NOTE ABOUT OUR NEW LOCATION!!



The 1984-85 season of monthly Knock-Out competitions will get underway on SATURDAY, October 13th, at the Willingdon Heights Community Centre, 1491 Carleton, Burnaby. As mentioned in the last edition of the Newsletter, the Knock-Outs will be held on Saturday nights this year. It is felt that Saturdays will be more condusive to the ceilidh atmostphere we're hoping to attain, as well as to attract more of our Junior members who will not have to contend with a Mini Gathering contest the following morning. It should also make life a little easier for our competitors travelling from Victoria. So as not to conflict with the Gaelic Society, our Knock-Outs will be the SECOND Saturday of each month with the exception of December which has been booked for Saturday, December 1st. Our new location covers all our basic requirements: mediumsized hall with good acoustics, excellent tuning rooms, ample parking, no stairs and a good-sized kitchen and bar.

Starting in October, the Gaelic Choir, Scotland bound in '85, has been invited down to treat us to a selection. 
