

SCOTTISH WORLD FESTIVAL, TORONTO, AUGUST 17-20, 1972

With nine months to go we are rapidly heading into the home stretch! Enquiries continue to pour in from all over from pipe bands, dancers and clan societies. All this interest shown from so many people and places has convinced us we are riding a real winner. Be sure you and your group do not miss out!

We were honoured to have two important visitors from Scotland during the 1971 Canadian National Exhibition. They were Robert Nichol, Secretary-Treasurer of the Scottish Pipe Band Association and Pipe Major John Weatherston, a member of the S.P.B.A. executive and Pipe Major of the world famous Red Hackle Band.

Our guests saw the grandstand area where the activities will be focussed under the same conditions that will exist next year. They were impressed with the facilities available. Bob and John also visited York University and toured the accommodations area proposed for our feature bands from the United Kingdom and other visiting bands looking for economical living quarters during their stay in Toronto. They were both very much impressed with the bright, modern and clean bedrooms, the huge dining areas, shopping facilities and recreational areas that will be provided at York University. The huge campus space also allows for convenient practice areas.

During their stay our guests met with the executives of the Pipers and Pipe Band Society of Ontario as well as prominent Pipe Majors in Toronto and returned home more than satisfied that all is well with the Scottish Festival.

For those of you who may not have seen our last newsletter and are connected with a pipe band, here is a detailed repeat on the accommodations at York University:

"We have blocked 1,350 beds in residence buildings on two of Toronto's York University campuses. All of this accommodation is in the form of single and twin bedded rooms without private bath. More than half of these rooms are located in air conditioned buildings. There is no maid service available. We think you will like the price which is \$5.75 Canadian and which includes breakfast. Those wishing lunch and/or dinner can be provided for at the rate of \$1.50 Canadian for lunch and \$2.00 for dinner."

As promised in the last newsletter, we are enclosing entry forms for the piping and drum major competitions in all copies of this edition addressed to pipe bands. We hope you will action them as soon as possible to allow our executive time to commence more firm planning in these areas.

Entries for the dancing competitions will be mailed separately in the very near future. Tull details on the dancing competitions will be contained in our next newsletter.
