## P.I.H.G.A. DELEGATE'S REPORT FROM SEATTLE MEETING, November 17, 1979.

The third and final meeting for 1979 of the Pacific International Highland Games Association was held in Seattle, Washington. Thims got under way at 1:00 p.m. and concluded about 4:00 p.m. Mr Stephen Morrison of the Seattle Highland Games Association had things well in hand for this meeting, which, of course, was the Annual General Meeting of the P.I.H.G.A. and time for a new slate of officers. Mr. Wallace Mactean, Presidaut, chaired the event, and paved the way for the election by vacating his chair and appointing Secretary-Treasurer Mrs. Upton to supervise the election of a new President. Mr. MacLean was unanimously remelected and promptly assumed his duties again. Futher election results unkr his direction saw the following posts filled: -First Vice-President A.J. Duncan (Mr. Duncan was not present but had given in a letter consenting to any office other than that of Presidet): Second Vice-President Mr. Stephen Morrison: SecretaryTreasurer Mrs. Helen Upton; Apointees-- Mr. Rickard - Chairman of Heavy Events. This is a new position and should help to improve the field Competitions. A. Skalazub -- Pipe Band Chairman. A。 Reid - Piping Chairman.

After the elections a lively discussion took place regarding the weak position the President"felt the P.I.H.G.A. had fallen into. It has become an unknown facet of the Highland Games that it purports to influence. Better public relations were suggested. I would suggest that we support this by mentioning in our newsletter the results of the meetings held and also just what part the P.I.H.G.A. is supposed to play in our activities and the worth of belonging to it. Without stronger member association input, the organization, it was felt, would fast become an anachronism and fall by the wayside. Conversely, a strong P.I.H.G.A. could serve a very worthwhile and even necessary function in Games promotion.

Mr. Skalazub of the Western Pipe Band Association presented us each with a list of Pipe Band Competition Rules Changes for the 1980 season. The most outstanding change is that of requiring Grade 1 pipe bards to submit two medleys for all medley competitions. The medleys to be submitted on the Games Entry form or to the Western Pipe Band Association. The medley to be played will be chosen by a draw and the bands informed in the morning of the Games!

It was felt by the Western Pipe Band Association that solo drumming competitions should be held in the morning part of the day and thereby not interfere with pipe tand judging in the afternoon.

To sum it up, I would like to say that I enjoyed this meeting and I think they have chosen good officers. It remains for us to get behind them by making sure our membership knows that this organization exists, and just what it does for International Competition at Highiand Games.

A round of applause was extended Stephen Morrison, our host, for the tea, coffee and sandwiches, and locale for the meeting.

Saturday the events will include Individual Piping and Drumming Competition - amatuer and professional - and Band Competition.

Professional Prize Money - per event - \$50, \$35, \$25.
Band - Class II -- \$250, \$225, \$200 Class III- \$200, \$175, \$150
Any bands not winning prize money, will receive $\$ 100$ Appearance money. We are hopeful of adding Class I Band Competition next year.

We are also happy to announce that the Spokane Highland Dancing Competition held in June each year at Whitworth has been moved to July 26th at Riverfront Park to coincide with our Festival.

Their will also be a Genealogy Booth with Tartan and Clan information.

Saturday Night will be a program with Massed Bands, Band Competition, Highłand Dancing and Scottish Cantry Dancing. This will be followed by a Ceilidh at the Ridpath Hotel with a Dance Band provided for entertaimment. The price is $\$ 2.50$ a person. This is the only activity that we will charge for during the weekend other than the Competition Entry Fees.

All Pipe Bands are invited to join the parade of Massed Bands Sunday at 12:30 into Riverfron\# Park preceding the "Kirking of the Tartan" Ceremony. A program of Dancing follows, concluding with the "Toast to the Haggis" - a sample of which will be distributed to everyone in the audience.

THE 16th A.G.M. held Saturday 19th January 1980 in San Jose, California saw several changes in our Contest Rules. Contest Sponsors were present and indicated changes for the better, with the possibility of more band contests this year.
The agenda included proposed amendments passed as follows:

1. Tie breaking order of preference; 1. Ensemble 2. Piping Total 3. Drumming Total.
2. Band Fees; To be raised to $\$ 50.00$ with $\$ 10.00$ late charge, Juvenile Bands \$25.00 with \$10.00 late charge.
3. Time Limit: Grade 1 will play from 5 to 7 minutes and all other grades from 4 to 6 minutes, with no stop-watch timing. Bands will..be on their honour to observe the limits.
4. Bands will not be required to play a different set of tunes or added tunes wen playing-up. The invitation to play-up is at the option of the sponsors.
5. Grading for 1980 will appear in the Quick Reference Grade List in the 1980 issue of the rule book. Dunvegan and the Black Ravens have been regraded to Grade 2.

The representatives of the Contest Sponsors have agreed to favor the following event priority 1. MSR, 2. T.L. Additionally they agree to refer the suggestion of raising travel money to their respective committees.
