

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EDITORIAL

With the new year upon us and the Christmas holidays but a blur, it's perhaps time to focus on our "Raison D'Etre", the Summer Games. Since inheriting the newsletter again I've flipped briefly through some back issues and the one topic that drew more attention than any other was the sad state of affairs at our outdoor gatherings. That was fifteen years ago and sadly not much has changed. Granted, we have beer tents, the scheduling has improved drastically and we have three of the top pipe bands in the world in our midst. But the dancers are still front and centre for the best part of the day and the only spectators present are the competitors' parents and grannies. If we're lucky the odd tourist or local enthusiast will stumble upon the event despite our efforts to discourage them. reasons for this situation are the same to-day as they were fifteen years ago. games associations have neither the money nor the volunteer help to stage much beyond what we have been experiencing to this point. The volunteers that have assisted in producting our local games have our undying gratitude but, I'm sorry, when I see what can be done in Santa Rosa, in Cowal, in Maxville, in Chicago, etc., etc., etc., its obvious we're missing the boat. I don't believe we can duplicate a Santa Rosa in Vancouver for various reasons nor could we clone Cowal but we know the potential is there and we know the interest is there, so what's the answer? Apart from the financial and people deficiencies mentioned earlier our biggest obstacle to presenting a big annual highland games, not the one shot wonders we've seen in recent years, is our apparent lack of trust of one person or one association spearheading such a venture. The comments usually read "well, what is he/she getting out of this?" or "he/she always has to run everything." Well, I have two suggestions that merit some thought. The first one would be for our United Scottish Cultural Society, the new name for the United Scottish Societies Auditorium, to form a highland games committee. As you know, this group, in which we are a member, is in the process of procuring funds for the construction of our new building. As one convinced that games can turn a profit, I can think of no better way to kick off the fund raising campaign than to promote and run a Highland Gathering. The number of associations and the expertise found within those groups would provide the "people power" while a small part of the money gained from the sale of the auditorium would provide the working capital. With a figure of \$800,000.00 being quoted as the target for fund raising a calculated \$30,000.00 risk pales in comparison.

The second possibility would be to follow the rest of the western world and 'privatize" the games! Bill and Brian would be so pleased if one, or a group, in our midst were to present a Highland Games for their own profit.

Just a couple of suggestions for a topic that deserves a lot more than talk.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

The following letter has been forwarded to the Piping Times.

Dear Seumas:

With reference to your November editorial regarding my views on M.S.R. requirements, I believe a few points deserve clarification. At the outset I'm not "new to the task" having published the newsletter for a number of years prior to my present engagement (you must remember your discussions with the late John McEwing through the B.C. Pipers' Newsletter), but although the carpet does wear thin and many editorials are written tongue 'n cheek, you're correct in presuming that I really believe what I'm saying. My point in the editorial was that premier competitions deserve a more imaginative format rather than simply playing tunes twice through.

I suggested that the present set-up was instituted to separate the men from the boys. If this were the reason I facetiously proposed that competitors play their tunes three or even four times through. Regardless of the "crowd crush to get close to the action at Oban or cram the halls at Blair Castle and Inverness" I personally do not find listening to the same tunes played over as "the most exciting event in the piping programme". Two different M.S.R.'s as I suggested in my editorial, requiring competitors to submit, for example, three sets of two M.S.R.'s would still offer a challenge yet keep the event within the bounds of musical sanity. As you state, 216 possible permutations at Grants and Oban, to me, is an endurance event.

Since this particular article appeared in the newsletter it's drawn arguments from people in our own area, which is the reason editorials are written in the first place, but when, Mr. McNeil, does one's piping qualifications or lack of in some cases, determine one's ability to express views.

In that regard I'd be happy to discuss our respective qualifications in private, not in the pages of the Piping Times or the B.C. Pipers' Newsletter. Finally, I never stated that the task (playing M.S.R.'s twice through) was too tough for the B.C. Pipers. I think many of the top players in Scotland, who have been invited to Judge our Annual Gathering, would advise you to the contrary, and the steady stream of soloists, as well as pipe bands, from B.C. demonstrate that the B.C. pipers have not "chickened out".

COMMENTS TO THE CHANTER CLASS

These do not apply to all the competitors but should be known by all. The reason for playing with the tips (or from the first knuckle top hand outwards) of the fingers is that it makes it quicker, faster and easier to make grace notes. A very slight movement at the base of the finger produces a note. The little finger of the top hand should be below the level of the chanter so it does not interfere with any movement of the "D" finger. I know its above when playing "E", but at that time you cannot play or move "D".

We play with the bottom hand further over so that the shorter little finger reaches the chanter. A very important finger here is the thumb. If you can keep behind the "C" finger or slightly lower it will give your hand a better balance and $\frac{\text{pivot}}{\text{point}}$ point. Remember, it is almost impossible to strike the "D" with your thumb held above the fingers.

Maybe knowing the reasons for having to do some of these things will make it easier for you.

Lastly, I was very pleasantly shocked by the large turnout of competitors. The B.C. Pipers' future is secure if one can judge by the numbers, enthusiasm and quality of this group.

Open adult always a pleasure to be with and meet old friends. It is nice to see the class growing. There are lots more out there that should be coming out. Jimmy Wilson was the winner but I would also like to commend him on a very fine sounding set of pipes. The chanter and drones were well matched and well tuned. There is here; a good lesson for a lot of us to learn, and a good example for younger pipers to emulate.

Sheriff Macpherson of New Westminster, Willie McErlean, former lead tip for Triumph Street, Don Rankin, President of the B.C. Highland Dancing Association and Tim Hinchey, accordionist extraordinaire comprised the judging panel. Despite Neil Dickie's attempts to dance to a win, the judges gave the nod to Robbie MacNeil. Duncan Fraser made a good showing here and showed he's no slouch at the more "novel" light tunes.

The first match-up of the evening saw the final group of round one. Owen Reed, fresh from his honeymoon, was up against Neil Dickie. Unfortunately, Owen did not last long. He spent a good deal of time tuning. He did get the pipe socked in and started off in bold fashion. However, it was not Owen's night as he broke down. We certainly hope to see Owen entered in more events as I can assure you he'll be tough to beat. Neil Dickie, his way open to round two, was up next. Earlier in the day I had been talking to Neil. He had told me that to-night's knockout was going to be a serious venture for him. We were not going to see the Neil Dickie of old, with the usual clowning around, we were going to see him display his real musical ability. I could hardly imagine this happening especially after his performance in the warm-up. Neil did display some nice touches in his performance. His strathspey was superior to anything I heard all evening. However, once he hit the reels he must have been hit with the urge to show some of his own unique flashes. I think Neil mistook the auditorium for a kitchen. Neil proceeds to round two against the formidable Steve Geddes.

Duncan Fraser was to face Jamie Troy in the first match up of round two. Unfortunately, Jamie was ill and could not attend. I think it's the first time ever that Jamie has not shown for an event he's entered in. He expressed his regrets at not being able to attend. Duncan came well prepared to face Jamie. He played well and his performance was highlighted by a beautiful setting of "The Rakes of Kildare". It was a shame that Jamie was unable to attend as it could have been a real battle.

The impromptu part of the evening got underway. Neil Dickie was now in his element and set about entertaining the audience in his own imitable fashion. The novel event in the impromptu part of the evening featured a relay race consisting of teams of three players. The race included the eating of the worst haggis you could ever imagine and several other obstacles. The winning team consisted of Robbie MacNeil, Neil Dickie and Jack Lee. This team had an obvious advantage as Jack Lee will eat anything.

RECORD REVIEW

"Nous Sommes Prets", Simon Fraser University Pipe Band's first recording is an excellent sample of the band's musical progress. Recorded at Simon Fraser University, the album captures the band's sound tremendously well. The quality of the recording is certainly state of the art in as much as the chanter sound is concerned. Unfortunately, the only thing that keeps this album from surpassing the Strathclyde Police's latest album, as the all time best pipe band production, is the ensemble balance between the pipe corps and the drum corps. It would have been nicer to hear the chanters more "up front". The drum corps is too loud and the bass drum lacks subtlety. Considering how well the chanter sound was picked up I'm surprised the loudness of the drumming was overlooked. The effect is that the ensemble sound is dominated by drumming instead of having two units complementing each other. This is not to say the album is not good. It is a great album. However, from a critical point of view there is always room for improvements.

The selection of tunes on the album is very good. One of the outstanding cuts features the jig "The Old Woman's Dance". The opening selection is a March, Strathspey and Reel selection which shows good tone and execution which is heard throughout the album. There were two cuts I didn't particularly care for. On side two, John MacKenzie's Fancy is played in the same round idiom as the Kitchen Piper and from a musical standpoint just doesn't connect. The other cut that was not to my liking is the duet playing of P/M Lee and P/S Lee The playing is good but, if the band was trying something different to make the album standout, this doesn't do it. These criticisms aside, the album is well worth having in any collector's home.


- 1. Four life members of the Association include Malcolm Nicholson, Bill Lamont, Rod McVicar, Jack Lee and Donald Ross.
