

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EDITORIAL

Arguably one of the biggest events of highland games is the pipe band contest. Yet at many of our games the bands appear to be an afterthought. Not in fact, of course, but examine some of the treatment the bands have received this season alone. We'll be fair to everyone and start with our own Annual Gathering. The prize money for first place Grade I at the Gathering is \$400.00, and that's for ten people (mini bands). An open solo player can win \$200.00 for first in piobaireachd, \$100.00 for first in M.S.R. and a further \$75.00 for the jigs. In addition he or she would also win the aggregate which is an airfare to Scotland. The next event on the calendar was Nanaimo, where the lower grade results were announced during the Grade I contest. Victoria had no announcement period. No. announcement to introduce the bands and no announcement for the results. In Bellingham, of course, the contest was so late that nobody was left to watch. In Vancouver bandsmen were required to pay admission to the grounds. Kelowna had no announcement of the results and Portland wouldn't release the master point sheets to the individual bands. In addition to the above, some contests have adopted a policy of awarding prize money to one less band than entered. In other words our three Grade I bands play and only two get prize money. Ditto for Grades II and III. The Vancouver Ladies' had an experience in Portland about five years ago. They were the only Grade II band to attend and as such they were awarded second place prize money. They weren't even presented with the trophy! These are just a few observations I have noted. Everyone has their own list of horror stories. And to top it all off, the system for judging bands is so antiquated it invites errors and quite often does.

The purpose is not simply "games bashing" or to note the complete absence of the Western Pipe Band Association in any games matters over the past few years, but rather to use, promote and sell the bands at the various games.

For instance, Victoria on the long weekend is chock full of tourists. Tourists who want to see a corner of Britain. Have the bands parade in front of the Empress Hotel at Noon the day of the games and draw these people back to the park. July 1st weekend in Vancouver is the same story. Send the bands to Gastown, Granville Island, Stanley Park, etc., etc., etc., the night before and the day of the games. Use the bands to more advantage during the games. Let's have an M.S.R. and Medley event for Grade I at every contest. Let's face it, for a band player five to seven minutes is a very short time considering he's usually at the games for the better part of the day. Considering travel expenses, and practice time, playing two events makes a lot of sense. Allow the lower grade bands to play up a grade if they wish. In other words a Juvenile band would play in their own class and then come back and play Grade III. Apart from presenting more performances for the spectators it gives the lower grade bands a chance to gauge themselves against the next class. Use the bandsmen to judge some of the solo events. This way the games will be finished at a decent hour and the judging costs for the organizers a little less.

The standard statement from a games' organizer is that pipe bands are nothing but a drain on the coffers. That statement is probably true under the current state of affairs. It can be changed quite easily. We've got some of the best pipe bands in the world right at our doorstep. Let's use them!!

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Friends:

First of all let me thank you all very much for your kindness on my first visit to Vancouver. Especially to Ian and Mary MacKinnon for sharing their home with me for the ten days I was there. It was a tremendous experience to visit such a lovely city and it's surrounding areas, most impressive indeed.

Dealing with the reason for my visit, judging the piping at the B.C. Pipers' Annual Gathering. I was really impressed with the very good standard of playing throughout the different age groups that I adjudicated. In the amateur grade, I was pleasantly surprised by the good standard of finger technique, and phrasing of the tunes. It says a great deal for the excellence of the teaching they have been receiving. Possibly my only criticism here would be in the standard of the instruments, which were a bit below par. (prize winners not included in this comment)

In so far as the Open Contest is concerned, I thoroughly enjoyed the three events, possibly the piobaireachd, most of all. Especially Jack Lee's rendering of "Scarce of Fishing", a most pleasing performance on an excellent bagpipe. The M.S.R. competition contained many fine performances also, but I think Jamie Troy should get a special mention for playing such a marathon selection, indeed a test of stamina.

On Saturday evening we had the miniature pipe band contest, another well organized competition. I must say the competitors came fast and furious, hardly giving you time to fill in the points sheet. The lower grade bands should take a leaf out of the Simon Fraser University Pipe Band's book. It was one of the finest miniature band performances I've heard in a long while. (Look out Scottish bands).

Going back to the subject of point sheets, I do not like the way the total number of points are subdivided into five subsections. This causes confusion for the adjudicator, and takes his mind off the real reason he is out there for. That is to compare one band against the other with a clear mind. Well nigh impossible with the present system of points allocation. One figure at the bottom of the sheet would be suffice.

Congratulations to the B.C. Pipers in running an excellent competition. It was most enjoyable having such a distinguished piper as John MacDougall as my co-judge.

Dear Sir:

One of the comments in games editorials referred to two of the same Judges as Nanaimo; another mistake by the organizerss of Bellingham. On the whole I find the Editorials and comments in the Newsletters to be fair and constructive in criticism.

However, I would like to say a few words in support of that much maligned minority "The Judges".

Being one the the Judges that has appeared at two games I would like to make a couple of very salient points that get overlooked in generalities:

1. In Nanaimo, e.g. I judged Novice Strathspey & Reel and Juvenile Strathspey & Reel. Another Judge did the Marches for these classes.

It is amazing to note the similarity of names in the results - no collusion, no talking between Judges, no secret signals. These competitions were happening simultaneously.

2. I did not happen to judge either of these events in Victoria or Bellingham, yet one sees some of the same names appearing in the prize list.

I for one find it quite heartening to look at results from different Judges on different days and see a very strong element of consistency considering that drones stop, chanters choke, fingers forget and most of all the Judges are mere mortals.

The <u>SECOND SATURDAY</u> of each month is what we're aiming for, but there may be some changes. For instance the first competition will be held on **OCTOBER 19TH!**

This year the first round tune requirements will be:

- 3 2 part marches (any time signature)
- 3 2 part strathspeys and reels
- 1 4 part jig
