

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#### EDITORIAL

I've been accused of being a little "non-controversial" in recent editorials and while those comments haven't prompted this particular piece, I feel it may precipitate some discussion.

Suppose that non-pipers were to have voting privileges in the B.C. Pipers' Association! Now before you jump off your chair and swear that no drummer is going to run the B.C. Pipers, sit back and read on.

First of all the statement doesn't refer to drummers in particular, but rather to anyone willing to participate in the affairs of the Association, whether he be a drummer or a nuclear physicist.

It's becoming increasingly difficult to find nine volunteers to stand for election on the Board of Directors each year. Most of our active pipers are just that - ACTIVE pipers. They are involved in teaching, playing, judging, running bands, etc., and are not able to offer a commitment to the B.C. Pipers. The problem is that because these people are active in piping, we need their expertise and knowledge.

By opening up the Board to non-pipers we could draw from the wealth of talent we have in Vancouver to assist in organizing our various functions. Perhaps then we would have the manpower to form a permanent Annual Gathering committee; one that could meet regularly year-round, investigate new sites, seek corporate sponsorships, etc. Maybe we could have a permanent judges' committee where people could take the time to examine judges' remarks, plan judging seminars, update judges' lists, etc. How about a pipe band committee? With the W.P.B.A. seemingly fading, perhaps a committee of four pipers and two drummers could discuss and recommend improvements in our present system. A competing pipers committee? How many piobaireachd should be submitted at various contests? Should we mix M.S.R.'s? Should we have separate gradings for piobaireachd players? These are things they could discuss. A B.C. Pipers field committee at all the highland games? A big highland games? The list goes on.

It's true that under our present rules there is nothing to stop these committees from being formed. The problem is nine directors can only sit on so many committees in addition to regular meetings before they get spread too thinly. I feel that rather than going on volunteer recruitment drives for each function we should have permanent "work parties", for want of a better term, and I think to ask people for this kind of commitment they must be offered some say in the running of the affairs.

Let's be honest. Does it take a piper to be involved in the building of the new Auditorium, investing our trust fund, organizing the Annual Dinner, the Gathering, etc.? I wouldn't be opposed to a situation where non-players took over the day to day running of the Society, leaving any matters relating to piping to the various committees. There are many different ways this could be set up and safeguards installed to prevent a completely non-piping Executive from happening. For those of you completely opposed to the idea, three of the hardest workers on the present Executive are non-pipers.

I must emphasize that I believe the present Board is giving the membership an enormous amount of their time and energy and are doing a first-rate job.

I'm interested in your comments.

#### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir:

Remember the old Scottish Auditorium? Terrible old thing. Gas leaks. Smells. Questionable plumbing. Terrible acoustics. But lots and lots of character. I loved it!

Who used It? Pipers, for a few things. Vancouver Film Board. I don't know what for. And a host of other organizations, some even connected to the Scottish community of Greater Vancouver.

Who owned It? Officially, the United Scottish Societies Auditorium Ltd., incorporated as a company April 22, 1938 under number 16,197. I know because I have a copy of the Certificate of Incorporation. Quite an impressive name, and a very desirable objective:- "United Scottish Societies". Seems back in 1938 or so, during a time of very slow economic times, occasionally referred to as a depression, some bright lights in the Scottish Community said, "We need a home!".

So, who were these United Scottish Societies? Initially, its a bit uncertain but in 1974 the then erstwhile directors I suspect realized they were sitting on a reasonably valuable asset and they should bring the records up to date. It seems that share certificates were issued to replace "lost" certificates to Vancouver Ladies' Pipe Band; Royal Scot Camp, S.O.S.; Lord Twedsmuir Camp, S.O.S.; Glengarry Camp, S.O.S.; Glamis Camp, S.O.S.; Heather Lodge, D.O.S.; Royal Scot Camp, Ladies Aux.; B.C. Highland Dancing Assoc.; B.C. Pipers; Caithness Assoc.; Gaelic Society; Glasgow and District Assoc.; Moray, Nairn and Banff Assoc.; St. Andrews and Caledonian Soc.; St. Andrews and Caledonian Ladies Aux. and Royal Scottish Country Dance Soc.

Then in January, 1976, and I don't know why, some additional shares were issued, one each to B.C. Pipers; Gaelic Society; Moray, Nairn & Banff; St. Andrews & Caledonian; and Royal Scottish Country Dance Soc. Each paid \$2,000.00 to the Company. It was probably spent on some sort of maintenance and repairs for the dear old building.

Well, here we are in 1985, and economic times "ain't so good". The old building apparently was condemned, so in 1984 the Directors of the United Scottish Societies Auditorium Ltd. decided the old girl should be sold. And the deed was done, rightfully so in my mind. They got \$640,000.00 for It. And they want to keep the "Nova Scotia" Societies in Greater Vancouver united, so they bought a lot, in Marpole. There are only two things noteworthy, in my mind, about Marpole; the first being that it is in an industrial area and it smells; and the second being the Fraser Arms Hotel where my buddies and I used to drink when we were at University. The area stunk back then in the '60's, too.

The Directors of the U.S.S.A. Ltd. want to build a new Scottish Auditorium on the lot they bought. The lot cost about \$230,000.00 and the building

they have had plans drawn for will cost somewhere between \$800,000.00 and \$1,000,000 to build. In December, 1984 they started talking about a fund raising committee, and in January, and in February.

Should the building be built? I have an opinion and I have voiced it to the directors of the Company. I am one of those directors. But I am not going to tell you my opinion right now. I want to know yours. Why not write c/o the Newsletter, and we can discuss it at the Annual General Meeting of the B.C. Pipers on May 10, 1985.

Incidentally, did you know that a new Society was incorporated with the intent that it build the new building? Its called the United Scottish Cultural Society, but there is still some doubt if it can be used for its expressed intent, because of tax complications.

## ANNUAL DINNER

The formalities of the evening included a few words from the President, a toast to the Association from Past President Peter McNeil, greetings from Vancouver Island Pipers' President Bill Mossie and a "sales pitch" from Vice-President Duncan Fraser on the new Auditorium. Other head table guests included Life Member Malcolm Nicholson and his daughter Kay, and Life Member Jack Lee.

Following dinner the Knock-Out Final got underway with each player being introduced by Peter Aumonier. First up was Duncan Fraser who started off confidently with a lovely sounding instrument. Unfortunately Duncan didn't get too far into his selection before breaking down. The third player of the evening, and the eventual winner, was Andrew Bonar, who executed well on a good sounding instrument. Runners-up Duncan Fraser and Robbie McNeil each received \$75.00 which they immediately donated to the Auditorium Building Fund.

The balance of the evening was devoted to socializing (much to the consternation of the disc jockey) with a Gay Gordons and Eightsome thrown in for good measure.
