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EDITORIAL

An article in the recent Pipe Band, the publication of the Royal Scottish Pipe Band Association, struck a chord and deserves to be expanded upon. The writer's main point was directed towards the practise of bands wearing full regimental dress, suggesting that they were "apeing" the military and raising the question of the legality of this practise. Although his comments on this subject were both interesting and amusing, his thoughts on the dress of female pipers is what caught my eye. What follows is my opinion on the matter.

Since the top Scottish bands discarded their "Number Ones" for contests and the Eastern bands locked away (forever, I hope) their buckle shoes and tartan hose, the casual observer would be hard pressed to distinguish the Strathclyde Police from a band from B.C., Ontario or Australia. The top solo players from around the world are likewise unidentifiable as to country of origin.

Not so for pipers of the fairer sex. Their dress runs the gamut from nylon stockings to white hose to tartan hose to frilly blouses to even frillier blouses all the way to full dress including spats and feather bonnets! Luckily that range of dress is not found in these parts yet.

The problem started, I suppose, one historic night when Triumph Street elected to allow women into their band. Until that time, girls played in ladies bands and we had no problem. So a girl joined Triumph Street. What would she wear? (Right about this time some wag will say, "What difference would it make? Nobody looked the same in Triumph Street at that time anyway!") What she wore was a Vancouver Ladies style uniform minus the plaid and hair sporran and substituting white hose for tartan. Seemed like a good idea and that set the standard for quite a few years. S.F.U. refined it by turning out their lady pipers in shirts and ties. An improvement I think.

But then girls took to wearing white hose with their own kilts (as opposed to band) in solo competitions. Now white hose in the interests of uniformity in a mixed band is acceptable, but for solo playing thick white socks on a girl do absolutely nothing for the girl or the dress. The latest development was the insistence of the S.F.U. Pipe Band that their female members wear Ghillie brogues in Scotland.

The writer of the article referred to at the start of this piece suggests women could wear something based on the Aboyne dress with nylon stockings, rather than disguising them as oddly shaped wee fellas. I personally prefer the Vancouver Ladies style for a ladies pipe band and a white blouse with tartan hose for solos.

For a mixed band? I've got to think S.F.U. has the best bet with shirts and ties, but <u>sans</u> the brogues. For a mixed band with full dress? What do you think?

KNOCK-OUT

The best opening night crowd ever was on hand for the first round of the new season's Knock-Outs. Over 150 people packed the confines of the Willingdon Heights Community Centre to take in a night of pretty decent piping.

The evening's entertainment kicked off with the warm-up. The requirement was a polka. The event had to be considered a success as only three pipers played Liberton Boys! Jill McKay was declared the winner by Judge Hal Senyk and was presented with the customary bottle of Bells.

The main event was run off in two segments of three players each. As mentioned in last month's Newsletter, the top three players out of the six advance to the next round.

The first group featured Angus Macpherson, Duncan Fraser and Jack Cairney, with the trio of Jill McKay, Bruce McIntosh and Cheryl Taylor following. This year the march requirement in the selection was not restricted to any particular time signature and this produced a varied selection of 2/4's, 3/4's and 6/8's.

Despite drawing in October, all six players turned in entertaining performances. Unfortunately for Bruce McIntosh his was a little shorter than the others, going off the tune in his second march. Duncan Fraser also had some bad luck. Big Dunc perfected a trick he learned a couple of seasons ago - having your bass drone shut off in the last tune of your selection. This was Jack Cairney's first time in the "pit", as playing in front of the Knock-Out crowd is affectionately known, and he acquitted himself very well. Judges John A. McLeod, Terry Lee and James Watt gave the green light to Angus Macpherson, Jill McKay and Cheryl Taylor to proceed to the next round in February where they'll meet the winners of the November Knock-Out.

The "impromptu" part of the evening was supposed to have been built around an Oktoberfest theme, but as two members of the Knock-Out committee were playing and the other two were out of town the plans went slightly aury. This part of the night was introduced by Hal Senyk who was kind enough to present the Piobaireachd of the Month. Hal gave a short presentation on the various types of tunes before treating the audience to his rendition of Duncan McRae of Kintail. Judging by the tone of his pipe, Hal should still be there for the Knock-Out final when the dust settles.

The proceedings were finished off with an open impromptu Jig contest. It was most encouraging to see 13 players get up to play in this event as that is what the Knock-Outs are all about - people getting up and bashing out a tune, not just the Knock-Out competitors. A recent refugee from Saskatoon, Iain MacDonald, judged this event and quickly got into the spirit, awarding such prizes as Best Beard (yours truly), Most Unhighland Bagpipe (Andrew Bonar), Best Shined Brogues (Hal Senyk) and Nicest Kilt Other Than Triumph Street (Bruce McIntosh). The winner, incidentially, was Duncan Fraser who finished with three drones this time.

A great start to the season. See you all next month!

As mentioned previously, the aim of the meeting is not for somebody to stand up in front of the class and teach us how to judge, but rather to get an exchange of views and ideas and, hopefully, get everyone thinking in the same direction.

The following is a loose agenda of the topics that the committee has submitted for discussion. Please feel free to add your own comments.

1. Judges Sheets

- discuss and examine present sheets
- explain purpose of format
- improve or replace current sheets
- should score be presented to competitor?

2. Scoring

- panel judging conference or blind?
- use aggregate point system, total points or merit points?

3. Problem Areas

- what do you do when a drone stops
 - breakdown at start of tune
 - chokes and chirps
 - wrong tunes played in event requiring submission
 - ...

4. Judges Duties

- writing comments
- are you obliged to write a book?
- require more than good, good, good
- should you write comments during a performance
- emphasize good points for younger players

5. General

- should being a member of the professional class be a requirement for judging
- should you judge your own pupils
- apprenticeship judge programme

6. Pipe Band Judging

- a discussion on judges' sheets and scoring system if time permits

- update the scoring sheets

- publish an up-to-date list of judges
- periodically review judges comment sheets
- maintain an apprenticeship programme
- hold regular seminars

DONALD ROSS - DIRECTOR

Donald is the longest serving member of the Board and that fact tells you a lot about this man. He has been a member of the Society for over twenty years and a Board Member for the best part of that time. He was the founder of the Knock-Out programme and closely associated with every Annual Gathering for the past two decades.

In recognition of Donald's hard work and enthusiasm, he was elevated to active membership and thus became the only non-piper to achieve this status in the B.C. Pipers' Association.

No matter who is asking for help, Donald is always there. Whether it be to organize games in Chilliwack, Kelowna or Courtenay, he's there. If he's asked to run an Annual Dinner, steward an Annual Gathering or sell tickets to this function or that, he's there. What piper around these parts hasn't had Donald snapping at their heels telling them, "Your up next!".

In honour of his years of dedication to the Society, Donald was awarded a life membership to the Association at the 1983 Annual Dinner.

BILL RUSSELL - DIRECTOR

Bill's association with piping came as no surprise as both his father and grand-father were Pipe Majors in the Canadian Army. If that wasn't enough he is related to the great Willie Ross on his grandmother's side.

Bill was born in Calgary and started receiving piping lessons from his grandfather. He also took up highland dancing for a short time during a period of mental instability.

During his early years the family did a considerable amount of moving - from Calgary to Ottawa, to Belgium, back to Ottawa and finally to Vancouver. During this time Bill received instruction from his father, John McKenzie, and George Grant, ex-Scots Guards. After moving to Vancouver he attended Jimmy McMillan for lessons and was a member of the Seaforths under Jimmy Lang and Bruce Topp. Bill's major accomplishment at that time was winning the Caber Feidh Trophy for Amateur Piobaireachd in front of Neil Angus MacDonald at the Annual Gathering.

Bill's association with the Board started in the early '70's when he sat as Secretary under Bill Elder. His work necessitated a move out of town and it wasn't until recently that we've had the good fortune to have him back on the Executive. In addition to his regular duties, Bill is one of the Trustees for the Society. His work in this regard has been most rewarding for the Association.

CANE FARMERS REVOLT!

During the summer in Scotland there was a one man advertising campaign at the games conducted by Mr. Geoff Ross, an Australian.

He has invented a new type of drone reed. Basically it is a plastic body with a regular cane tongue. On the face of it this product seems to have many good features and to date there are very few, if any, criticisms.

Some of the features:


- 1. The reeds can be matched for strength, tone and pitch because of identical construction.
- 2. The cane tongues are treated with a wood preservative to prevent water damage and problems.
- 3. Plastic bodies are stronger than cane and can withstand much more accidental abuse.
- 4. Probably the most important factor the pitch of these reeds can be altered by changing the small plug that fits in the end of the reed. (An assortment of plugs comes with each set of reeds.)

To my knowledge three of the Grade I bands had some of these on trial and seemed to be satisfied with the results they were getting.
